FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Congratulations to our Year 8 students who drew compliments in regard to their participation and behaviour on their recent excursion, facilitated by the Moree Plains Shire Council.

Yesterday, I had the opportunity to travel to Coffs Harbour with CSO staff and another Principal, to view a recently constructed hall, in a new education facility. This has given vision and ideas to be considered for our **school hall**. For this project, we are classified in Round Two and our project must be finished by January 2011. At this point, I do not envisage construction commencing until mid-2010.

The reality for us living in Moree is that we are isolated! Generally, to participate in **excursions and sporting trips**, St Philomena's students are required to travel long distances. This requires extensive arrangements with bus companies and much planning is needed to get these activities off the ground. *Our goal is to give parents a minimum of one week's notice for payment.* Running the bus has to be a viable option. Consequently, all permission notes and payment are required to determine if the event will go ahead. Regrettably in the Secondary department, I have made decisions to cancel trips due to lack of student response by the required date. In a nut shell, **it is essential to have notes and payment in on time in order for an event to proceed.** We cannot run buses at substantial losses. Sadly, at times the complacency of others can disadvantage the committed and interested.

Thank you to parents who have taken the opportunity to meet teacher/s following the distribution of **Semester One Reports**. Tonight is the final night (Secondary) for K-10 interviews. Should you have missed this opportunity; K-10 staff will meet parents on another occasion, by arrangement.

Planning for 2010 now commences and begins with the enrolment process. All applications from the current parent community for **Kindergarten and Year 7** should now have been received. If you have not yet followed up on this please access your forms from the school office to assist us with this process.

The following are very important reminders for uniform requirements in 2010.

- The current **ballet style or slip in shoe** which is in vogue with specifically Secondary girls, does not meet OH&S standards, in particular for practical lessons. The same applies to a **slip in style of canvas shoe** which trots out on sport day. These provide no support for physical activity. The safety aspect of both these types of shoes is consistently communicated to the Secondary body. The loss of our chain store shoe shop has restricted access to a broader school range. At the commencement of the 2010 school year, both of these styles will not be permitted, under any circumstances and are at present considered unacceptable.
- For K-6 students, the St. Philomena's sports, as per the Secondary will be a compulsory article of uniform.

The **School Board and Parents' and Friends' Association** work effectively and often very quietly in the background to assist our school. I would like to again thank and acknowledge the work these groups undertake. The Parents' and Friends' Association frequently needs assistance on one off jobs. If you can respond, you will find your involvement somewhat fun and rewarding! Don't forget the Quiz Night this Friday night!

Re: National Partnership on Literacy and Numeracy (for Primary Schools)

In April 2009, students in Years 2, 3 and 4 in our school completed a *Schools Step Up* baseline assessment in literacy and numeracy. I am now able to advise you that our school has been identified to participate in the National Partnership on Literacy and Numeracy.

How Were Schools Identified for Involvement in the Literacy and Numeracy National Partnership?

Government and Catholic schools eligibility was based on a range of criteria.

- The school's student background characteristics including:
 - Enrolment size
 - Aboriginal student enrolment

- Student language background,
- Student enrolment data, for instance, a large proportion of refugee students or a large proportion of Aboriginal students
- Community - the degree of 'disadvantage' of the schools or group of schools.

• The 2008 National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) data: potential to raise student achievement in reading and numeracy in Stages 2 and 3.

National Partnership on Literacy and Numeracy

Access to funding in this National Partnership will give our teachers and school executive opportunities to further develop their teaching of reading or numeracy. Involvement in this National Partnership will support our school to develop and build on:

- effective, evidence-based teaching reading or numeracy
- strong leadership and whole school engagement in literacy or numeracy
- effective processes to use school data to inform teaching and learning practice.

Access to funding

Funding is available to support our school's access to this initiative.

Participation will be for two years to achieve the National Partnership targets in reading or numeracy. Access to the funding will support:

- analysis of our school data on reading or numeracy
- involvement the school leadership team in a leadership development program
- participation in a whole school intensive professional learning program on reading or numeracy for implementation in Stages 2-3
- implementation of an intervention approach targeting individual students in Stages 2 and 3 who are experiencing difficulty in reading or numeracy.

Next steps

Our school, with the assistance of personnel from the Catholic Schools Office Armidale, will identify the programs and strategies from the Federal Government's list programs that will best meet the needs of our school. Our school will then commence implementing these programs and strategies as soon as possible.

Being part of this National Partnerships project will bring many benefits to our school and to our students. It is a great opportunity to significantly enhance our current programs that aim to improve literacy and numeracy learning outcomes for our students.

WEEKLY REFLECTION

18th WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME, YEAR B

Only if we believe that Jesus is the bread of life will our physical and spiritual needs be satisfied.

It is a great challenge to our belief in Jesus that we are asked, simply, to believe in him. In the days of Jesus' time on earth many people sought Him out just to fill their bellies: **"You are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves"** (Jn 6:26).

Jesus does not get angry at this but simply offers what seems like some strange advice: **"Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life"** (Jn 6:27). The people ask Jesus how is it that they can please God? He replies: **"Believe in him whom he has sent"**(Jn6:29).

In Jesus' time, a man claiming to be a prophet had to legitimize himself with a sign. The people talked about the time of Moses and how great Moses was with the manna in the desert. **Jesus claims that it was not Moses who produced the manna, but it was God who did so.**

The people asked Jesus for this bread, but He says: **"I am the bread of life"** (Jn 6:35). He is the giver and the gift as well. He is the new manna given by God. **"Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty"** (Jn6:35).

We know that faith helps us to open our eyes, to see God, and this prompts us to learn more about God. In time we will be filled with hope because we have a greater understanding. The product of faith and hope is love or charity. Love is an action word – the way we treat others is the way we desire to be treated. **We have to desire to see God. This beatific vision is in fact heaven itself.**

The Eucharist – Holy Communion – is the greatest act we can participate in this life; it is a pledge of eternal love; that love is Jesus – the perfect love.

So we pray: Jesus, in your wisdom you bring us into the love of the Trinity. You bless us and make us whole. May we in our wisdom begin to understand you and share our life with you and others, day by day. We ask this prayer through Christ our Lord.

H1N1 Influenza (Human Swine Influenza).

Dear Parent/Caregiver,

4/8/09

I am writing to remind you of the current information regarding the control of H1N1 Influenza (Human Swine Influenza).

In regard to procedures for responding to the illness, the Australian Government entered into the phase of response known as the PROTECT Phase back in June. This phase was introduced because the virus is currently not as virulent as was anticipated, and is generally only producing a mild disease in most people, severe in some and moderate overall.

The advice from NSW Chief Health Officer, Dr Kerry Chant about responding to Human Swine Flu in this PROTECT phase is as follows:

“...people who have no underlying medical conditions and are experiencing only mild flu-like symptoms should stay at home and minimise contact with others, until they are well. People who develop moderate symptoms should see their GP. Those with severe symptoms should go to their nearest Emergency Department.”

Based on this information, advice to schools is as follows:

a) Any student or staff member who develops flu-like symptoms should stay home until well again, and see their doctor as necessary.

b) All students and staff should maintain a very high level of personal hygiene.

This advice essentially means that the usual processes for responding to student illness are the same as they would normally be. However, what is also very important is that you remain vigilant in checking on the ongoing health of your child. Please watch carefully for signs or symptoms of flu-like illness such as fever, cough, headache, unusual tiredness, muscle-ache, sore throat, chills or shortness of breath. Keep your child away from school at first sign of illness.

The advice from NSW Health is that pregnant women, as well as people with underlying chronic diseases, are potentially more vulnerable to the more serious effects of all forms of influenza, including the H1N1 strain. With this in mind, to prevent contact with pregnant staff and parents and members of the school community with pre-existing health problems, **I especially seek your assistance in ensuring that your child does not attend school with flu symptoms. I ask that you particularly mention this to the medical practitioner who assesses your child so that appropriate caution is exercised.**
